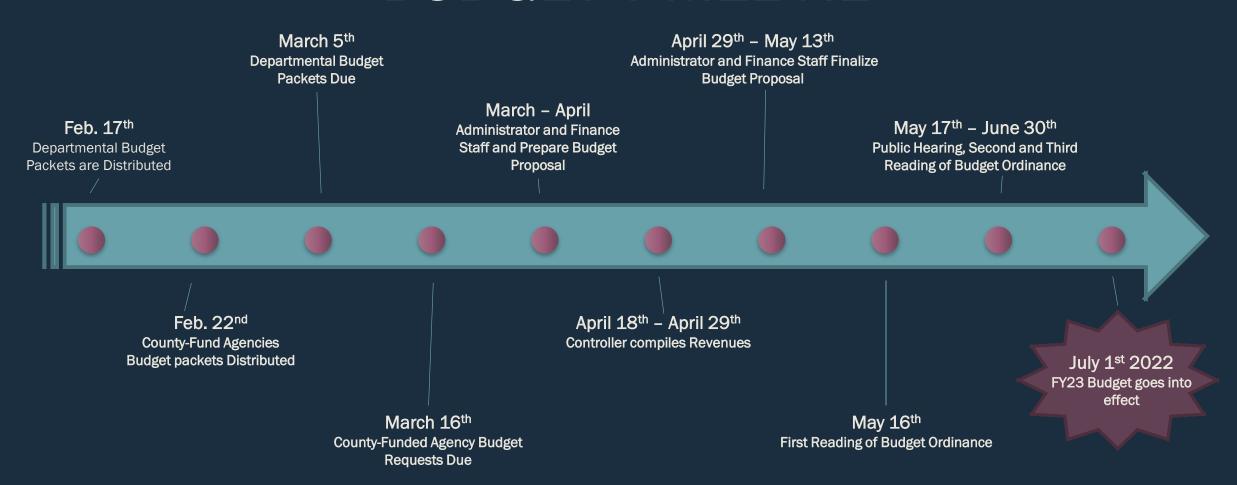
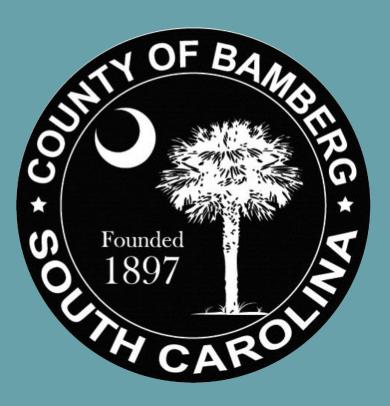

Proposal: Cost of Living Increase

3% to match state budget

Goes into effect the first pay period after July 1, 2022

Projected Effect on Budget: \$140,240

Proposal: SC Deferred Compensation Program Match

Establish an annual match for all employees who contribute to the South Carolina Deferred Compensation Program.

Contribution cap at \$300 per employee who contributes.

Projected Effect on Budget: \$36,000

Proposal: Retention and Recognition Plan

Developed in conjunction with the

Personnel Committee of the Bamberg County Council.

Goal is to recognize continued years of service and continue to retain employees.

The proposal is to bring employees to the midpoint of their pay grade scale after 7 years of employment. This increase will be contingent upon supervisor approval and a positive annual performance performed on their employment anniversary.

Projected Effect on Budget: \$77,505

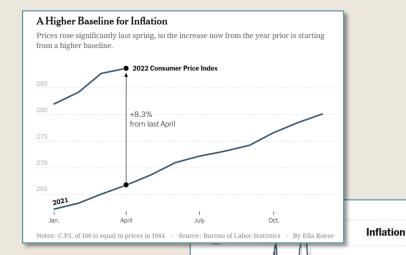
#1 Inflation

- Inflation is rising at it's fastest pace in 40-years
- Currently up 8.3% from April of 2021
- Driven by rising cost of fuel and supply shortages.
- Even at peak, a slower-than-expected slowdown.

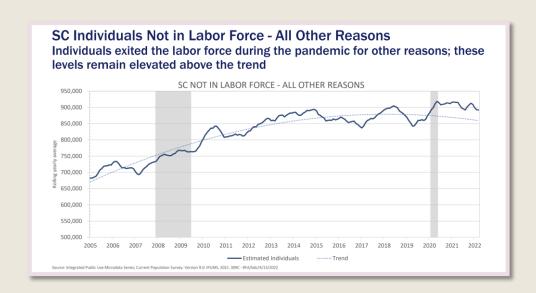


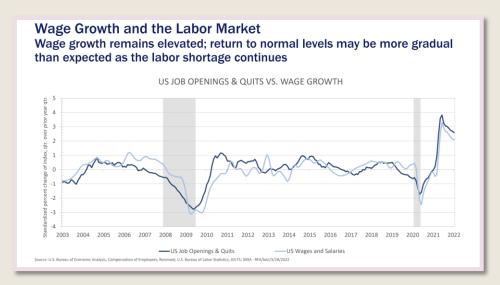

#2 Labor Shortage

- Government Agency Employment down 2-4% compared to prior years
- Labor Shortage For every 10 job openings there are only 8 applicants
- Retail and private employment agencies offering competitive salaries

Personnel Additions Requested

Department Request Effect on Budget

Treasurer

Full-Time Installment Clerk

\$60,605

If property tax installment plan is implemented, a new clerk would be required in the Treasurer's Office to manage this program. Clerk would need to have extensive accounting knowledge.

Detention Center

2 Full-time Officers

\$126,046

Currently, only 3 officers during the night shift – 1 in control room and 2 in booking area, making hourly rounds and booking newly transported inmates. Offenders are getting more violent.

Magistrate

Part-Time Magistrate Judge

\$25,085

Caseloads continue to increase, requesting another part-time judge to act on an on-call capacity with a maximum of 8-10 hrs. per week. Bond hearings are required twice a day, 365 days per year. An additional judge would allow for the rotation of weekend bond duty to be every 3rd week.

Personnel Additions Requested

Department Request Effect on Budget

Voter Registration

Part-Time Clerk

\$11,765

Additional assistance with day-to-day procedures. An additional clerk would ensures the office is staffed during hours of operation during out of office training, election equipment preparation and election verification. This clerk would alleviate the need and costs associated with poll worker and contractual services workers staffing the office.

Dispatching

Reclass PT Dispatcher to FT

\$43,345

This would allow more flexibility in providing shift coverage while reducing overtime pay.

Fire Service

2 FT Firefighters

\$122,415

Many of the county's volunteer firefighters work outside of the county while those working locally are often unable to leave their jobs for emergencies. The volume of medical calls has increased significantly. Having paid full-time responders for the county would improve reliability and response times.

Personnel Additions Requested Continued

Total Effect on Budget if all requests were approved: \$389,261

At this time, we are recommending only for the part-time dispatcher position to be re-classed to a full-time position.



Proposed addition's effect on the budget: \$43,345

Many departments are asking for new computers as the current systems are older and there are compatibility and system storage issues.

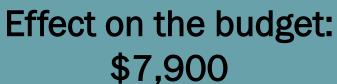

FY23 Capital Requests Continued

Treasurer's Office \$23,050

If property tax installment plan is implemented, the initial cost of the software required would be approximately \$15,300. Other additional known costs include: computer, telephone, desk and other furniture, supplies and forms, and additional postage costs.

Detention Center \$25,590

Updated Camera System – Currently there are 18 cameras with no audio capability. More cameras with audio capabilities are needed for blind spots inside and outside the jail.

Updated Control Board – Current control board is an older model with buttons that need to be replaced.



Addition of Juneteenth as official paid holiday

The human resources department has requested approval for the County to recognize and observe this holiday annually on June 19th or the Monday after when it falls on a weekend.

Juneteenth is a holiday commemorating the end of slavery by marking the day enslaved people in Galveston, Texas learned they were free.

On June 17th, 2021, President Biden signed a bill including Juneteenth, or June 19th, as a federal holiday.



Proposal: \$5,000 increase to all 9 Fire Stations

Projected Effect on Budget: \$45,000

Dear Mr. Preston.

Times are tough!! We are struggling to get what our Fire Department needs to keep us successful. We need air packs and bunker gear. As you know, these items are expensive.

Last year we had 133 fire calls in the City and 57 fire calls in the County. We are really stretched with helping the County emergency services. We assisted with 111 medical calls in the City and 26 medical calls in the County. That is 2.6 medical cases a week. Total fire and medical assist calls were 327. That is nearly a call a day.

We are going to have to have financial help to make this operation work. My employees are putting themselves out there to assist at a high risk to the City. That is a good many man hours that we are spending assisting medical cases. My fear is having a fire and a medical case at the same time....are my employees liable leaving a medical case to go fight a fire? I think when I talk to my insurance that will be the case.

I really do not know what figure to put out there....we need so much. We have a wonderful fire department, and they go beyond the call of duty. I would like to make sure when they go out to save someone's life they have the equipment they need to do so. If you could increase our budget by \$5,000 it would be greatly appreciated.

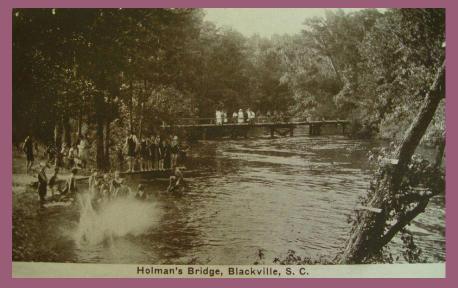

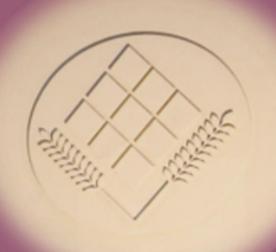

800 Radio Initiative

Problem: Current system is unreliable and does not provide sufficient coverage throughout the county.

New System Benefits:

- Improve officer safety
- Consistent radio contact throughout the county
- Multi-county communication
- Direct communication with Medshore

Proposed Plan:

Use a phase approach

Phase 1: Dispatch

Sheriff

Code Enforcement

Phase 2: Fire

Spread the cost over a couple of years while continuing to look for grant funding.

Property Tax Implications

Expect a millage decrease

Around 3.5mils

\$20

A home valued at \$100,000, assessed at the owner occupancy rate with 2 vehicles with the average value of \$15,000 will see a \$20 annual decrease on property taxes

\$14

A home valued at \$50,000, assessed at the owner occupancy rate with 2 vehicles with the average value of \$15,000 will see a \$14 annual decrease on property taxes
